Course Content

Abstract

This course is designed for absolute beginners who wish to learn Hungarian as a foreign language. Over 14 weeks, students will build foundational skills in speaking, listening, reading, and writing Hungarian. The course will cover essential grammar, vocabulary, and everyday communication, while also introducing students to Hungarian culture, customs, and traditions.

Course Objectives:

- To develop basic communication skills in Hungarian for everyday situations.
- To understand and apply fundamental Hungarian grammar rules.
- To build a practical vocabulary for common topics and scenarios.
- To gain insights into Hungarian culture and traditions.
- To foster confidence in using Hungarian in real-life contexts.
